### **RUSSELL LEE: THE MAN WHO MADE AMERICA'S PORTRAIT**

*Russell Lee: The Man Who Made America's Portrait* opens Saturday, September 17, 2005, at both the museum (1:00 p.m.) and at Temple College's Visual Arts Gallery (2:30 p.m.). The joint exhibition, on loan from the **Witliff Gallery of Southwestern and Mexican Photography**, examines the photojournalistic work of one of the most prolific American photographers of the twentieth century. Lee (1903-1986) is well known for his photography from 1936 to 1942, working for the Farm Security Administration (FSA), a New Deal program designed to assist rural communities during the Great Depression. Of the many photographers employed by the FSA, Lee created perhaps the largest body of work, about 30 percent of approximately 164,000 images. Lee's career spans four decades. His work captured America from the wheat fields to industrial sites as well as everyday life. He worked extensively in Texas and taught at the University of Texas for eight years before retiring in 1973.

### RECENT ACQUISITIONS

**Drs. B.J. & Bob McConnell** have given the Bell County community an extraordinary gift: a collection of "flapper" dresses, unique handbags and other dresses that date back to the 19<sup>th</sup> century. The four exquisite flapper dresses, worn by Bob's mother, Harriette Klaner McConnell, are extremely rare because of their remarkably good condition; normally, the fragile chiffon of which most of these dresses are made shreds and tears, due to the weight of the beading. Another interesting aspect of them is their sizing; Bob explains that his mother wore three of the dresses before his birth, in 1922. After 1922 Harriette no longer maintained the same slim figure, but she certainly maintained her stylish sense of fashion, as the fourth (larger) dress exemplifies.

Bob gives some interesting accounts regarding his rather unusual lineage. He states that on the night that she was to make her debut with the Chicago Opera Company, Harriette eloped with the future father of Bob, Glen G. McConnell. Her father, Fred Klaner, was a mortician in 1920s Chicago who, according to family legend, buried the notorious gangster Al Capone. Interesting family!

## Coming Soon.... New Holiday Ornaments!

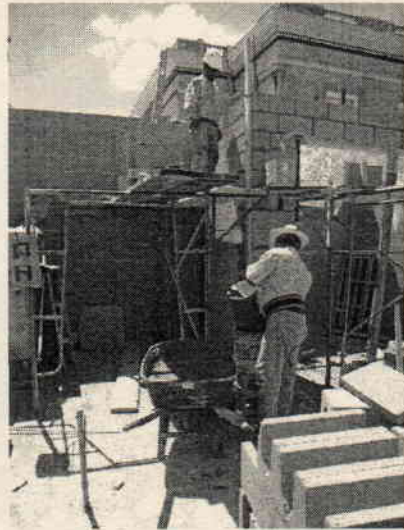
This year, the museum continues its series of historic church ornaments and will also be creating a special ornament of the centenary Carnegie library building. The church ornament is Belton's First United Methodist Church. Its historical marker reads:

*Founded in 1850 when Bell County was created, this church was part of a circuit until 1869. By the 1880s, the members had outgrown their original church building at Pearl and First Avenue. This larger sanctuary was erected in 1884-86 . . . . Constructed of locally made bricks with a native stone foundation, it features Gothic style detailing.*

Both ornaments will retail for \$15.00 plus tax; museum members receive a 10% discount on these and other items in the museum store.
